Prior to WWII, the family table was unequivocally the center of most American homes. More than just a place to eat together, it was a place for families to share the details of their lives and to remain tied to one another; an invitation to eat with the family was a welcoming gesture of friendship.

After the war, America's families changed dramatically. Bit-by-bit the family table was replaced by the family car as the center of family life. Nowadays, the majority of time parents spend with their children takes place in the car. School, soccer, dance lessons, swimming, play dates, parks, weekend trips to theme parks and concerts, and long drives to visit grandparents all require time spent in close quarters on four wheels.

Their family grew quickly over the subsequent years as Brandon, Addison, Brookes, and McKinley joined them. (The Moore family now includes Brandon's wife Kate, and six-month old Jack.)

For most of their marriage, Michele was a stay-at-home Mom—doing everything except stay home! While their four children were at school, she planned events and undertook fundraising for Shriners Hospitals.

A GREAT ANNUAL TRADITION




David Thompson, one of the resident teachers at the Oregon Shakespeare's Festival (OSF) in Ashland, offered an excellent 30-minute lecture in Carpenter Hall before the outdoor evening performance of Hamlet:

> "Something is rotten in the state of Denmark.... What a piece of work is man...? The lady protests too much.... Get thee to a nunnery!"

"Shakespeare's plays are just a bunch of clichés," joked Thompson, in his pre-play introduction to the themes, characters, and plots of Hamlet.

We all come to this political play, perhaps, with more baggage than others. Its enormous backstory goes back decades and it has been said that Hamlet is the best play ever written about a young man, one of the most intellectual characters in literature. It is such a great play because it tells so many stories in such detail. Every single production is unique and there are many meanings in this tragic play of redemption.



How many ways can we go with it? A variety of answers can be

- Why does Gertrude marry Claudius? There are few clues.
- Is there evidence that Hamlet is 30?
- Why is Hamlet cruel to Ophelia?
- Does Hamlet have an aversion to sex with all women?
- Is Hamlet completely off his rocker? Or when in the journey does he lose control of himself?

Two other plays for which a Preface is offered this season are *The Winter's* Tale and The Wiz, a musical from the story The Wonderful Wizard of Oz. Visit www.osfashland.org or call 800.219.8161 too book your tickets.

Theatregoers are also invited to a free post-matinee discussion with OSF actors daily (except Mondays) until October 16. Following the performance of *Richard II* in the Thomas Theatre, a friend and I went next door to Carpenter Hall for a most amusing conversation with K.T. Vogt, who played the Duchess of York in Richard II. Next season, she will be cast in the role of Falstaff in the Merry Wives of Windsor.

Time to Head to the Park,

By Kimberly Martinez

In 1871, the head of the U.S.
Geological Survey of the Territories,
Ferdinand Hayden, set out with a team
of 50 men to survey an area of the western
territories known as Yellowstone. Unbelievable
tales of impossibly deep canyons and mythical splendor had been
reported but received as mere works of fiction. Hayden decided it was
time for the professionals to see for themselves the potential value of this
land. The natural world they found astounded them, leading them to
make an unprecedented decision: rather than divvy up the land among

Among the men in Hayden's party were painter Thomas Moran and photographer William Henry Jackson. Together, the three men lobbied Congress on behalf of the American people. Hayden assured lawmakers that the land was unsuitable for use as farmland, ranching, or mining; Moran and Jackson plied their skills as artists to document the wonder that few could easily believe. Thanks to their efforts, a bill was proposed that would set aside a 2-million acre tract of land in Montana and its surrounding territories as a 'public park or pleasuring-ground for the benefit and enjoyment of the people'; and charging the Secretary of the Interior with the task to 'provide against the wanton destruction of the fish and game found within said park, and against their capture or destruction for the purpose of merchandise or profit'.


themselves, or allow it to be used for the profit of a few, they would ask that the government set it aside, to save it, for the use of everyone.

On March 1, 1872, President Ulysses S. Grant signed the Yellowstone Act of 1872 into law. I find it remarkably poetic that the man who wielded a sword to secure the freedom of all Americans, wielded a pen to secure their collective right to the best land the nation had to offer.

In the subsequent years, men such as John Muir and Theodore Roosevelt served as unyielding shields, protecting the natural heritage of all Americans through a time in history when robber barons flourished; railroads simultaneously built and destroyed; and thousands of families risked everything in pursuit of land to claim as their own. It is thanks to the efforts of these and numerous other men and women that the National Park Service was established at the hand of President Woodrow

Wilson on August 25, 1916.

My own family has visited many National Parks over the years. This summer, we were very fortunate to spend time in five parks: Crater Lake, Glacier, Yellowstone, Grand Tetons, and Lassen Volcanic. (My husband and I were particularly pleased to find that there is still virtually no cell reception in most areas of the parks... and better yet, no Pokémon Go.) Last summer, my daughter started a collection of National Park patches, which she has proudly sewn onto her high school backpack. I asked Melissa why she loves going to the parks so much. "I think it's because I have a lot of memories of family times in the parks, and being in untouched land makes me really happy," she said. In July, she hiked up one of the Tetons. "Even though halfway up I felt miserable and wanted to quit, once I got to Surprise Lake I felt so successful and glad that I stuck with it."

2016 marks the centennial celebration of the National Park Service...and California is home to nine of America's 58 national parks! It's time to get out and visit these places that have been so carefully preserved for us.





GOLD RIVER HISTORY: Did You Know

In 1901, the Natomas Company (an agricultural development company) built a gravel crushing operation called the Fair Oaks Rock Crushing Plant. The operation existed on the south side of the American River, behind our current Gold River Community. A railroad spur off Sunrise Boulevard accessed the area.

The plant crushed rock from gold dredger tailings to create railroad 'ballast' which was the foundation for railroad tracks. The company was the largest rock crushing plant in the United States. It was in operation from 1908 to the late 1950s, running 24-hours a day, seven-days a week. The company shipped an average of 45 train cars of crushed rock daily, totaling more than 16,000 cars per year. The Natomas Company sold the operation in 1929 to Pacific Coast Aggregates. In later years, crushed rock was used for roads, dams, overpasses and other transportation systems nationwide.

According to Fair Oaks History Center docent, Jean Cress-Black, "American River rock was particularly desirable because it is heavier than other crushed rock. It was used at Aerojet for the reason that it would not be as easily blown around by the blast from rocket engine tests." Of course, the weightier American River rock would also be an asset for train ballast, as it would not be easily blown around by the steam from

Flat bed rail cars, the remains of employee housing, and conveyor belts can still be seen in the abandoned site.



The Fair Oaks Rock Crushing Plant provided housing for its employees: both bachelors and families. Today, off Sunrise Blvd. just east of the existing former river rafting rental building is a large flat area where other plant housing was located.

Below is a photograph of a foundation of one of the structures. The old foundation is on the south side of the access road.

Along the concrete foundation to the left of the center, some steps can be seen. Above the concrete foundation a low, river rock retaining wall is visible. There is a former flagpole out of the picture to the right. The concrete driveway and flagpole lead one to believe that this may have once been an office.

To access this area from Sunrise Blvd., turn right along the access road (not the recreation trail) from the former river rafting rental building, in the direction of Hazel Avenue. (Source: Fair Oaks History Center.)
